The abandoned British graves of Muntok 1943-45

My Mother, Mrs Shelagh Lea nee Brown (internee Sumatra 1942-45), apologized before she died in 2005 that she was leaving the problem of her Mother's grave in Muntok, Banka Island, unresolved. My Grandmother, Mrs Mary E Brown of Singapore had died on 17/1/1945 and was buried at Muntok.

I was wondering how to proceed after hearing that Alan Harfield had died.

On November 25th 2011 I received an email from Ralph Armstrong former child internees and (author of 'Short cruise on the Vyner Brooke').


"I have only recently been told that only the Military graves at Muntok were moved to Jakarta, not the civilian ones. The civilian graves were abandoned apparently. Is this true? "

Unfortunately, I had to reply that as far as I knew from my Mother's years of correspondence with the CWGC, it was completely true. These British Civilian graves had been lost, due to the CWGC policy of having nothing to do with civilian war graves. I could tell Ralph was very upset by the news concerning his Mother and one of his sister's graves in Muntok. His other sister had died at Belalau, Sumatra (the 6th and final camp) and her grave together with all the other civilian graves there had been moved to Jakarta.

I discovered that Judy Balcombe (her Grandfather died and was buried in Muntok) had visited Muntok in 2011 with Anthony Pratt (his Father died and was buried in Muntok). Judy had written an article about their trip, and so I immediately started to correspond with her. Anthony's solicitor, Oswald de Sybel, had discovered my Mother's letters, written over many years to the CWGC, in the Archives at Kew. Anthony and Mr. de Sybel knew about my mother's efforts to get some form of memorial for the Muntok graves and had picked up the trail.

When my Mother had received no help from the CWGC in the 1990s, she then met Alan Harfield from BACS (British Association for Cemeteries in South Asia) He agreed to write a Memorial Booklet for the Muntok graves, which would give families some memorial to treasure. Unfortunately, the years went by and Alan became ill and died 2 years after my mother, without finishing the booklet.


Judy and Anthony were planning to visit Muntok again in February 2012 and so Stephen (my husband) and I joined the party. Alan Harfield's widow, June, returned all the information about the graves that my Mother and Alan had collected. We then set off with the plan and photographs to discover the fate of the graves!



After the war, The Dutch moved all the Women internees' graves to this Cemetery from the shallow graves at the back of their camp at Kampong Menjelang.

The Men had been buried in this cemetery by their friends when they died. Around 1948, families were able to request photographs of their relations' graves from the Dutch authorities in Singapore.

In 1961, the Indonesian government requested that smaller war cemeteries be closed. The Dutch authorities moved all their military and civilian graves to Jakarta. The Dutch informed the British but the British only moved their military and a few 'service' graves, leaving the British civilian graves of 31 women and 58 men behind.

By the late1960s the remains of this cemetery now looked a mess. The remaining crosses were falling down, overgrown by weeds and long grass. Several reports were given to the British Foreign Office, stating the deteriorating condition of these graves, and yet nothing was done, and the graves were eventually lost.

The following photos were taken by a Indonesian religious minister from Palembang who visited Muntok in 1968. He also wrote detailed lists of the names still visible on the crosses.





"Let us not forget" was discovered amongst Margie Caldicott's parents' papers, dating from the 1960s.

"LET US NOT FORGET".

"Volunteers to dig a grave". So the word went round. XX has died, her body no longer able to withstand the great demands made upon it, her Spirit ready for her Master. Her last words were "I will pray for you all in Heaven". She had had typhus, and then there was no food to build up her strength. In the so called hospital, there was only enough water to allow one cupful per person per day for washing purposes. This in the tropics in sweltering fever heat and those nursing the sick, themselves in need of rest and care. And now the call for "Volunteers to dig a grave". When will the rough coffin be sent or will the body have to lie in the open for 24hours and quiet vigil be kept, as on a previous occasion? Out of the barbed wire they go, those able at the time and with the strength for the digging. Peace? Quietness at any rate. No longer the noisy, dusty, dirty equalor behind the barbed wire. Human bodies, skin and bones, struggling for existance, struggling to help each other - orphaned children in a bewildered small world - sad sights - only silent happier memories of a past existance. The task is finished, back they come weary, silent - no water to wash off the dirt, the sweat, but triumph only that a need has been met, a task accomplished. A rough box is brought; will the boards hold? The small procession forms, how heavy the load, how slow the pace. The Camp is silenced, another body laid to rest. The way was steep, the clay heavy, the service simple, the prayers sincere. The Rymn 'O God our Help in Ages Past' never more appropriate, and favourite packs more inspiring. One broken body now triumphant - for her Faith was Sure and her life of Sentence. So the word went "Volunteers to dig a grave". Scripture appropriate, and favourite peals more inspiring. One broken body now triumphant - for her Paith was Sure and her life of Service Witness Supreme in her Death. Women honoured woman.

There is no one now to care for her Grave, no one is responsible for her last resting place. The end came soon for her, but there were many more like her, both men and women. Is she Chinese, is she English, Eurasian or Scotch? Is she Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Church of England or a Plymouth Brethren? She had loved Malaya, in her work or in her home. It was only the sad fate of War that caused her to die so soon and in such hardship in an Allied Territory, now Indonesia. She was proud to be British in 1943.

No tombstone or cross now marks the spot of her last resting place - no neat mown grass covers the site. No for all she did, all she was - only the tropical growth of twenty-three years covers the site. The birds will be singing, the sunrises and the sunsets will lighten the spot, and the sun give warmth. Will there be buildings erected here in years to come or more battles fought?

She was just one of God's children, but let us not forget

Local people in Muntok tell us that houses started to be built in the cemetery area from the end of the 1960s, and then the Pertamina Petrol Station was built on the land in 1981. (The red and white bollards show the original cemetery entrance).



Human remains were found during building of the houses and petrol station. 25 Bodies were discovered during excavation for the garage, and the Catholic priest was asked if these could be reburied in the Catholic Cemetery.

In the Catholic Cemetery at Kampong Menjelang, near the former Women's prison camp, they lie in a grave with the inscription (translated by Mr. Mohammad Rizki)

"Here rest 25 British victims of the WW2 (1942-1945). Died in Muntok. Reburied at Muntok Catholic Cemetery on 19 March 1981".





Surely these are some of the Women internees? Their graves were on the plan where the garage now stands at the front of the cemetery.


We have lists of the remaining British Civilian graves with letters and numbers. There are one or two discrepancies, which we now have to investigate, but 2 of these lists relate to the cemetery plan (above).

Margie's grandmother Mrs. ME Brown Hobbins (the Dutch liked to put the maiden name after the surname) is in Plot 3 Row K No 10.

Anthony Pratt's father, Mr. Donald Frederick Pratt is in Plot 1 Row E No 15.

Judy's Grandfather, Mr. Colin Douglas Campbell is in Plot 1 Row E No 7.


And there are so many more people, buried near the friends with whom they had shared and endured so much for so long.

This cemetery was known as the Muntok Dutch, Town or Civil cemetery.

Below is **LIST NO.1** of 3 lists in Margie Caldicott's possession. Studying the lists, correspondence from the Netherlands War Graves Foundation and the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (formerly the Imperial War Graves Commission) and interviewing local people leads us to believe that 58 men's graves and 31 women's graves were abandoned in Muntok Cemetery.



Olga wrote beautiful poetry in the camps, despite not only having had a miscarriage on Muntok pier after shipwreck having been later imprisoned with 3 other British nurses in Palembang Jail for 6 months. They never discovered the reason for their imprisonment.
