



Narrative by Lieutenant J.N.C. Hancock, M.R.N.V.R. (Commanding Officer)

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(a) Movements: Acting under orders contained in a signal from Rear Admiral Malaya to proceed to Batavia via Banka Straits, at 1845/13/2 I sailed from Singapore and anchored at 2125/13/2 at No. 24 Swept Channel Buoy at the North End of Durian Straits Minefield, acting as Markship showing all round white red white 1ights. At 0620/14/2 I proceeded in a southerly direction, until 0930 when I anchored under north side of Great Durean Island. At 1715/14/2 I weighed and proceeded through Berhala Straits to Berhala Island anchoring there at 0945/15/2 on south west side of the Island. At 1400/15/2 I was bombed by a Japanese seaplane (near misses). At 2300/15/2 I weighed and proceeded south.

At 0900/16/2 anchored close (about 1 cable) to East Coast of Sumatra approximately 54 miles from Berhala Light where I picked up thirty one survivors from s.s. REDANG.

At 0700/17/2 proceeded east. At 0820 a Japanese seaplen (Navy 96 type) circled the ship out of range. I altered course to south west to a bay in the Sumatran coast, where I embarked seventeen survivors from H. M. S. GIANG BEE. About twenty more of these survivors elected to remain ashore under an Engineer Officer of GIANG BEE. I gave them provisions for at least one month and other necessaries. Fresh water was available. Marines G. Hayes (Ply. 100419), A. Wynn (Ply X 100418), A. Williamson, Stoker Purvis (C/KX 94791) and Private A.A. Henderson, A.I.F. (SX 10615) requested to transfer from TAPAH to this group. At 1815/17/2 I proceeded to North End of Banka Strait and at approximately 2245/17/2 with Muntok N. Light bearing east distance 4 miles was intercepted by a warship that signalled me in International Code to follow her to Muntok. I had reason to believe this warship to be Dutch, but later turned out to be a Japanese Cruiser. Confidential books were destroyed and all small arms were dumped overboard. At Muntok TAPAH was boarded by Japanese Naval personnel, Muntok being in their hands. No W/T messages had been received since leaving Singapore.

- (b) Ship's Company: Consisted of 2 officers and 17 European ratings in addition to which I was carrying 36 naval and 7 Army personnel and 2 civilians. These figures do not include survivors embarked.
- (c) All at (b) became prisoners of war or internees.
